## Three Kings: A story of hope and courage

In my Christian faith tradition this week, we celebrate the Feast of Epiphany on January 6. This is considered the day when the Wise Men come to visit the infant Jesus in Bethlehem. It is also considered in many traditions to be the 12th day of Christmas, because the season is felt to continue after the holiday itself.

There is much discussion in Christian and other faith traditions about how many of these individuals they were, and their status. For the sake of this discussion, we're going to assume there were three visitors based on the number of gifts they brought. We're also going to assume they were kings, based on the value of their gifts and other clues documented in the Old Testament of the Bible.

In addition to being kings, it is thought that at least one of the travelers might have also been an astronomer, because they were alerted to Jesus' birth by a star. It would have taken someone with this knowledge to recognize that such an event would have been preceded in this way.

The kings exit the story after the gift presentation and are not heard from again. Thus, we know very little else about them. But based on their behavior, some assumptions can be made. One that seems very pertinent given this time of year, especially as many of us attempt to make New Year's resolutions to improve our lives, is that they had to have been fearless. The gospel of Matthew describes three examples. First, when they wanted to know where the child was, they went immediately to Herod, the ruler of the area. Only men with confidence would dare approach him directly in 1st Century Jerusalem. Second, they received a message in a dream not to return to Herod. Another fearless and brave task, because disobeying the ruler usually meant certain and torturous death. Third, they returned home using a different route, making it different for Herod's soldiers to follow them, another act of defiance.

So, what can we learn from these three travelers as we begin 2026? We might not be trying to manage foreign terrain or have wealthy gifts to give an infant, but we can look at their fearlessness. Remember, this does not mean we will never have times of fear or apprehension, but it does mean choosing courage over comfort. Sometimes we are challenged to do just that very thing, to get out of our comfort zones and make tough decisions. It means having hope that every decision matters. Those decisions and choices might sometimes have consequences we may not always like, but they will always matter. This hope and this courage aren't just for a chosen few, it is for everyone, if we reach out and accept it and are willing to take the first step into the unknown. It can take a lot of

different forms: standing up for what we believe in, showing love and compassion by helping someone who has less than us. But regardless of the method, the important thing is that we don't let our fear of the unknown totally mar our decisions. Yes, we must be cautious, but we need to take a cue from the kings from the East who visited the Christ child and not let our fears take over our lives. Be strong, and courageous!
